As Fall begins and we prepare for our Annual General Meeting, it's time to look back and take stock of our accomplishments. This was another big year for us and our community, marked by inspiring highs, deeply affecting losses, and exciting future perspectives.

We recently lost three pioneers of elder abuse prevention: Jill Hightower, Judith Wahl and Dr. Elizabeth Podnieks. Each blazed a trail to ensure that the well-being and safety of older people would be taken seriously. They were fierce, unstoppable advocates who wanted older people to be recognized, valued, and celebrated. Each pushed elder abuse prevention to the forefront of national and international conversation and inspired many to follow suit. Like many people in our sector, I owe them a lot and I deeply value the conversations that I had with them since my early days at CNPEA.

One development that would have delighted Dr. Podnieks, is the progress made at the United Nations' Open Ended Working Group on Aging (OEWGA) where the recommendation for an international Convention on the rights of older people was made in the Spring. In August, the United Nations member states adopted a resolution paving the way for a UN process to establish a convention. As I type these words, we are awaiting further developments, notably whether the matter will now proceed to the Human Rights Council. CNPEA was in NYC in the Spring, along with many Canadian civil societies, ensuring that the voices of older Canadians were represented during the OEWGA.

CNPEA also had the great privilege of attending and presenting at the impressive, first Community-Based Seniors Services Forum in Ottawa. Change is afoot. The many stakeholders who provide services to older people are ready to claim their space as a sector and make their voices and the voices of the people they serve be heard by decision-makers.

As we get ready to say goodbye to some of our Board members and welcome new ones, I want to thank the Board members, volunteers, donors and partners who have contributed to the work and successes showcased in this report. As always, none of it would be possible without your support.

#### Dr. ELIZABETH PODNIEKS

An international trailblazer in the field of elder abuse prevention, Elizabeth was a passionate champion of the rights of older people.

Among many other accomplishments, Dr. Podnieks founded Elder Abuse Prevention Ontario, as well as our very own organization, CNPEA, and she was a co-founder of the International Network for the Prevention of Elder Abuse (INPEA). She was also the visionary and architect behind World Elder Abuse Awareness Day, an official United Nations Day since 2006.



#### JUDITH A. WAHL

Judith was the founding Executive Director of the Advocacy Centre for the Elderly (ACE). She is remembered for her fierce advocacy for seniors, her lifetime work in elder law, especially on the issues of consent, capacity and substitute decision-making, for contributing to the development of legislation, and her work in supporting legal clinics throughout Ontario.



#### JILL HIGHTOWER

Jill was the Executive Director of the BC Institute Against Family Violence for 13 years. After retiring from that role in 1998, she became partner in a research and education consulting group focused on public policy, health and social issues affecting older women and did extensive research on violence against older women. Jill published and presented papers across Canada and internationally. Her contributions to elder abuse prevention and her focus on older women are invaluable.

## Future Us Goals:

- Prioritize elder abuse prevention in every community.
- Establish and support elder abuse prevention networks at local, regional and national levels.
- Teach everyone to recognize warning signs of abuse and neglect, how to respond safely and effectively and where to refer in the community to find help.

**CNPEA** continues to identify issues of relevance to older adults who are experiencing abuse in Canada and those who work to address this important health and wellness challenge. This year, we actively reviewed the recent federal budget to identify how the health of older people is being addressed and responded accordingly. In May, CNPEA also contributed to the 14th Open Ended Working Group on Aging at the United Nations—thank you to Benedicte for participating in person at this key event. We continue to forge and expand relationships with organizations who are committed to promoting social justice for older people across Canada and internationally.

This year started with the CNPEA Education
Committee aligning to the pillars of the 2024-2027
Strategic Plan and evolving into the Awareness and Education Committee. The Committee revised the Terms of Reference to incorporate the Strategic Goals to guide the Committee's work.

Work this year included focusing on opportunities to engage students, and exploring the potential development of accredited elder abuse training for health care professionals. The Committee also turned its attention to the CNPEA website and began to assess what would be required to update and improve it.

advancing Goal 2 of Future
Us.

CNPEA continues to develop and expand its collaboration with many different groups to expand its reach and identify new opportunities to develop resources and programs to support elder abuse prevention.

The work of the Governance Committee has focused on its primary mandate of overseeing and directing the **CNPEA** Board and supporting the work of our Executive Director. The Governance Committee has two subcommittees, whose primary objectives were **Board Nominations and** Recruitment, and formalizing a review and evaluation process for our Executive Director. The members of the Governance Committee also ensure that CNPEA remains in compliance will all regulatory requirements and worked to review and update our bylaws.

Foundational to our new strategic plan, the Fund **Development Committee is** working hard to ensure the network's sustainability. The Committee has developed a comprehensive sustainability plan for operational revenue generation. We have divided our committee work into two subcommittees: grants, and giving programs. The former locates and addresses applications for government and community grants, and we have had some success in this work. The latter includes initiatives such as Giving Tuesday, individual donations, corporate sponsorships, and other related activities. We continue to grow the Gloria Gutman Fund for Elder Abuse Prevention, which is focused on providing operational funding for CNPEA in the long term.

## Safe Havens Symposium

## Summary

The event aimed to:

- raise awareness of existing sheltering options for older adults who have experienced violence, abuse or neglect;
- highlight the stark gaps in shelter services for older adults across the country and the importance of including older victims in efforts to address the emergency shelter crisis in Canada;
- illustrate the role that support and response services, can play in assisting older victims by being trained to detect ageism and understand seniors' needs better;
- Examine best practices to provide safe, respectful, trauma -and violence- informed services and appropriate support.


